DEVELOPING THE TASTAFE EDUCATION BLUEPRINT

Education and training is a major contributor to the overall economic and social prosperity of Tasmania, and provides the skills and knowledge required to create a more rewarding and sustainable future for both the local and wider global community.

However, Tasmania's economy is changing. As we move from a reliance on traditional industry to new and emerging industries, our workforce and our training will need to change too. Tasmanians will need different skills and attributes to take advantage of new opportunities and to help our economy grow.

TasTAFE has a significant role to play in helping build the capacity of local communities and providing training that meets the needs of the future job market. As the largest public training provider in Tasmania, TasTAFE is well placed to lead the reform agenda and be proactive in developing real skills for real jobs.

In response to the need for a clear view of the educational priorities and benchmarks needed for the next 10 years, TasTAFE has begun the process of developing an Education Blueprint. In conjunction with a series of internal focus groups and a whole-of-staff survey, the TasTAFE Education Blueprint Working Group has identified four key themes:

- THEME ONE: Vocational Education and Training that is accessible for the Tasmanian community
- THEMETWO: Tasmania The State of Innovation
- THEME THREE: Learning happens in Partnership
- THEME FOUR: Learning is Contemporary and Cutting Edge.

Over the course of the next 12 months, TasTAFE will undertake a range of research and public engagement activities to inform the development of the Education Blueprint, and invites you to provide input by considering the four key themes and the following questions:

- What do the themes mean for the TasTAFE workforce and "system" of learning and training?
- What do the themes mean for TasTAFE infrastructure and technology?
- Are there other aspirations that you think are important for the future of learning and training in Tasmania?
